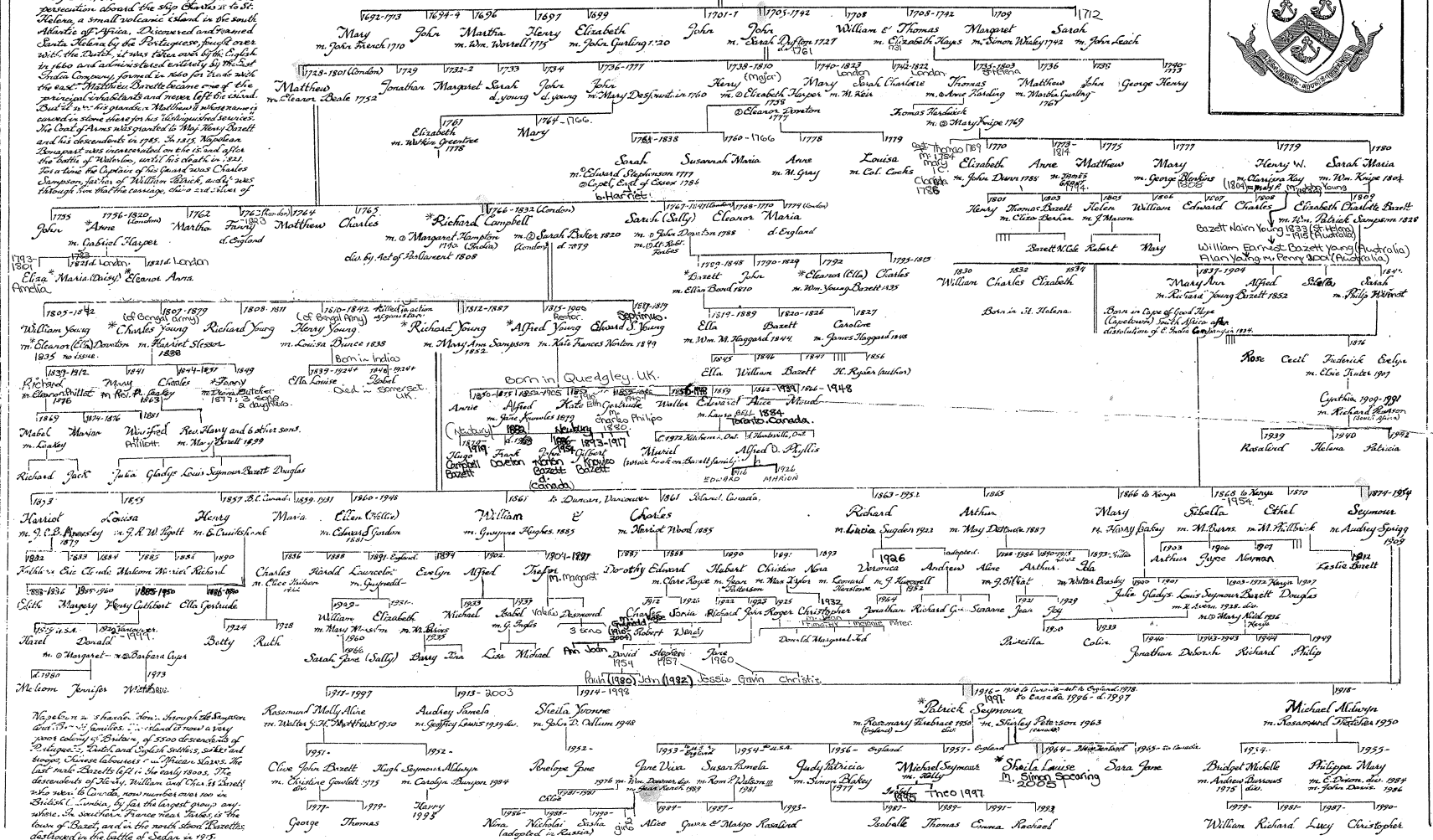


The name Bazette can be traced back to 875 A.D. to the Normans in the Seine valley of France, as based on the fact that, on April 21, 1091, at Chartres, was published a list of 277 Breton lords, continued to death for being attached to the Reformed Church. Among them was Pierre Bazette le jeune. Called Bazettes from 1260 one of them, Mathieu Bazette, fled from the persecution abroad the ship Charles in the harbor of a small Breton island in the south Atlantic off Africa. Discovered and named Santa Helena by the Portuguese people over with the Dutch, it was taken over by the English in 1600 and administered entirely by the East India Company, formed in 1600 for trade with the east. Mathieu Bazette became one of the principal inhabitants and never left the island. But in 1610 his grandson Mathieu's name is carried in some place for his distinguished services. His coat of arms is granted to his son, Richard Young, and is described in 1711. Mathieu's descendant was incorporated in the island after the battle of Waterloo, until his death in 1821. For a time the Captain of his post was Charles Simpson, later of William Bisset, and it was through the latter's marriage that the Bazettes came to St. Helena.
